These services should encompass mental health counseling, substance abuse treatment, job training, and life skills development. The integration of these services, guided by the biopsychosocial model, recognizes the interconnectedness of an individual's physical, psychological, and social well-being. This holistic approach is essential for fostering successful reintegration into society.

4. **Collaborative Partnerships: Leveraging Collective Resources and Expertise:** Collaborative efforts among governmental agencies, non-profit organizations, and community stakeholders are crucial for the long-term success of homelessness

reduction initiatives.
